

As always, I want to encourage all citizens to be proactive in crime prevention and in helping to keep our communities safe.


I am proud to serve as your Sheriff, and will continue to work hard in leading a professional and effective Sheriffs' Office.


## **ADMINISTRATION**


#### **BUDGET**

Three budget components create the overall Sheriff's Office Operational Budget: Sheriff's Operations, Jail Operations and E911 Operations









#### **Grants**

State and Federal grant funding continues to be a priority and is an important objective in meeting our goal of providing cost effective services.

Federal and NYS Homeland Security Grant monies continue to provide for essential equipment and information technology upgrades for emergency services and public safety.

In 2021, the NYS Governor's Traffic Safety Board provided a grant for \$14,580 for traffic enforcement and NYS Homeland Security and Emergency Services provided \$16,796. The NYS E911 Expedited Funding for the Public Safety Answering Point was \$129,555.

STOPDWI Funding provides for Special DWI Patrols, as well as equipment in support of DWI enforcement.





## **Public Service Programs**



The Sheriff's Office continues to be an active partner with the NYS Child Passenger Safety Program. Tioga County residents can make a reservation to have their child safety seat inspected as well as be instructed on the proper method for installing a child safety seat.

In collaboration with the Tioga County Department of Health, Deputy Kaden Siang continues to actively participate in several Car Seat installation events during the calendar year.

## Offender Watch®

Sex Offender Registration and Notification System Criminaljustice.ny.gov 1-800-262-3257

A free on-line service which provides citizens with the information needed to protect their loved ones. The service allows you to view known registered offenders and predators in your area. Knowing who these people are provides you with your best defense to protect your family – awareness. The service also allows for instant e-mail notifications which alert you if a registered sex offender moves within proximity to your home.

### Operation Safe Child

Using equipment that contains the latest digital fingerprinting technology and high resolution photography, the Tioga County Sheriff's Office provides SAFE CHILD cards for parents and guardians. In the event a child is lost or reported missing, these cards would serve as critical identification for law enforcement. The program is staffed by Corrections Officers who travel to schools and special events throughout the county during the year to process these specialized identification cards for children ages 3 through 15 years of age.

Unfortunately, due to the COVID-19 restrictions, only one Operation Safe Child event was completed.



In partnership with the NYS Sheriffs' Association, citizens can access the NYS VINELink which is an online resource that allows you to search for information regarding an offender incarcerated in State Prison or the 60 County Correctional facilities throughout NYS. This service is provided to assist victims of crime who have a right to know about their offender's custody status and when they are being released from incarceration. If you want to be notified of any offender's release, you can register to be notified by phone call, text message, in app, letter or E-mail. In 2021, 1,358 notifications were sent out.

## Law Enforcement Operations



#### **Road Patrol Division**

The Road Patrol Division is the primary law enforcement component of the Sheriff's Office. It is comprised of 26 deputy positions.

Their jurisdiction includes all of Tioga County, which covers 524 sq. miles with 1,089 miles of highway.

#### **Criminal Investigation Division**

The Criminal Investigation Division (CID) is staffed by 5 Investigators. Each investigator has extensive law enforcement experience and has received specialized training for conducting criminal investigations of serious crimes.

- Identification, apprehension, and prosecution of criminals
- Crime scene ID and management
- Evidence and recovered property management
- Conduct background investigations





The Sheriff's Law Enforcement Division (Road Patrol and Criminal Investigations) has been awarded re-certification from the NYS Sheriffs' Association – Law Enforcement Accreditation Program. The program is designed to establish and promote standards which are widely considered to be prudent and effective for operating a Law Enforcement Agency. It provides formal recognition that the law enforcement component meets or exceeds all 132 of the accreditation quality standards. The Law Enforcement Division has been accredited since 1998.

## **E911 Emergency Communications Center**





The E911 Emergency Communications Center is the sole PSAP (Public Safety Answering Point) for all of Tioga County and serves as the communications hub for all emergency services.

The center is staffed with 13-E911 Dispatchers and operates around the clock every day of the year.



## THE IMPACT OF THE OPIOID EPIDEMIC ON TIOGA COUNTY

In addition to tracking calls for service for the various police, fire and EMS agencies within Tioga County, the Communications Division also tracks the number of overdoses that occur within Tioga County. These overdose numbers include cases where non-opiates were involved as well.

In 2021, Tioga County experienced a total of 97 drug overdoses that police, fire and EMS agencies responded to. Of those calls, 55 were opioid related, 42 were non-opioid related and four were fatal overdoses. NARCAN was administered a total of 24 times.

The Tioga County Sheriff's Office Emergency Communications Center services 19 Fire/EMS departments, 7 police agencies and numerous other specialty agencies/divisions within Tioga County. The center also works closely with the Tioga County Office of Emergency Services as well as numerous other local, state, regional and federal agencies to ensure the safety of the lives and property of the citizens of Tioga County.



The E911 Emergency Communications Center was awarded re-certification from the NYS Sheriffs' Association – Public Safety Answering Point Accreditation Program. The program is designed to establish and promote standards which are widely considered to be prudent and effective for operating an Emergency Communications Center. It provides formal recognition that an organization meets or exceeds all 71 of these quality standards, which cover four major areas of the organization: Administration, Training, Technology and Operations. The center has been accredited since 2008.

## **Corrections Division (Jail)**



The Corrections Division is the largest component of the Sheriff's Office, consisting of 49 full time staff members. Operations are continuous throughout the year.

The jail is a maximum security facility authorized to hold 104 inmates. Sentenced and non-sentenced male and female prisoners age 18 or older are permitted to be confined in the facility. In addition to housing local prisoners the Jail is authorized and frequently houses inmates from other counties as well as Federal Inmates, NYS Parole Violators, Military Prisoners, and Civil Confinement Prisoners.

The facility operates within the statutory guidelines of the NYS Commission of Corrections and the NYS Corrections Law.




A total of 236 inmates were processed into the facility in 2021. This represents an 11% increase from 2020.


Of the 236 inmates processed, 171 were remanded by courts within Tioga County, accounting for 72% of the jail's population. This represents a 10% decrease from 2020.


The average daily jail population was 58 inmates.












County Inmate Population - Age Comparison







#### **Inmate Educational Services**

The Owego - Apalachin School District has provided updates to the classroom with the purchases of a new desk, tablets for students and needed school supplies. With these tablets, the inmates will have the ability to take them to their cells to continue educational activities. No Inmates participated in the TASC (Test Assessing Secondary Completion) program in 2021.

In addition to offering TASC instruction, the Jail also provides the following classes to our inmate population:

Instruction is provided by a variety of service organizations and the facility medical staff.



#### **Religious Services**

Religious services are provided by a variety of clergy and private citizens who are involved in their respective ministries. Religious preferences vary widely, and if the inmates' preference is a legitimately recognized faith, arrangements are normally made to provide those services.

Local churches and institutional ministries, visit the facility regularly to minister and counsel those inmates who show an interest in attending.

Group Services were suspended in 2021 due to Covid mandates however, inmates were allowed individual spiritual counseling and services by:

#### **Inmate Commissary**

Jails and Prisons in New York State are permitted to operate an Inmate Commissary, in which inmates may purchase hygiene products, snack foods, soup, coffee, and candy. Pricing for these items are fixed by the facility and commissary company to allow for the facility to earn a modest profit. Currently, the Sheriff's Office contracts with Trinity Services, a commissary company to provide goods and services. Twice a week inmates who have money in their jail account are allowed to order from a list of items. These items are ordered electronically and delivered twice weekly.

In 2021 the program generated \$22,419 in revenue and expended \$5,414. The money spent out of this fund helps to defray operating costs directly related to the inmates such as: recreational equipment, law library, education supplies, publications and various office expenses.

#### **Inmate Medical**

Inmate medical services are managed by a private contractor. CBH, P.C. provides "In-house" medical care, including dental and mental health services. These services are provided to inmates by onsite staff. At booking each Inmate is asked if they want HIV, STD and Hepatitis C screening. Medical and Mental Health staff also coordinate all discharge planning for inmates to have a successful re-entry back into the community. This involves collaborating with community agencies to provide educational opportunities such as life skills and self-help to become productive members of society.

CBH staff utilize the Jail's medical examination room, and a full dental suite. A full time certified RN provides daily sick call and care to the inmate population and a full time Mental Health Counselor is on staff to provide counseling and make treatment referrals. The supervising physician is always on call, and visits the facility once a week to provide treatment. The facility also provides in-house radiology services.

Total operating costs for medical services in 2021 was \$710,933.

Tioga County participates in the Centralized Arraignment Program also known as CAP Court. The court appearances take place twice a day, 7 days a week at 8 am and 8pm. The Public Safety Building has a designated court room where arraignments take place. In the past it was scattered around the county in 13 different court rooms. This allows Justices and attorneys to come to the jail or conduct a virtual court appearance in a centralized location. Detainees are able to meet with their attorneys before they participate in the arraignment process. Local judges are on a rotational on-call schedule to cover these arraignment times.

CAP is a result of new legislation aimed at ensuring the availability of legal counsel for defendants and reducing the burden on local courts. Any detainee that is arrested, not given appearance tickets and court is not in session will be brought to the Public Safety Building to participate in the arraignment and complete the book-in process.

In 2021, 219 detainees participated in this CAP Court. Of those, 139 were released, some with Orders of Protection to adhere to. The remaining participants were remanded to the County Jail with future court appearance dates, some with bail and some without.



## Weekend Work Detail (ATI)

(Alternatives to Incarceration)

The Alternatives to Incarceration (ATI) Program has been operating in Tioga County since 1986 and provides the criminal courts with a sentencing alternative through the use of community service.



An important part of the ATI is the Weekend Work Program which is administered jointly by the Probation Department and the Sheriff's Office. Eligible offenders are identified by the Probation Department and are recommended to the Courts. The Courts sentence the offender to the program for a predetermined amount of time. Once in the program, the offenders report to the Sheriff's Office each Saturday and Sunday to perform community service work.

Corrections Officer Roy Schreiner oversees all work projects and supervises the details. All work performed is for non-profit organizations, local government, and community based volunteer organizations. The work sites and jobs are planned and approved by Sheriff's Office staff.

#### **2021 Work Accomplishments**

In 2021, the Weekend Work Detail provided 280 labor-hours of work to a variety of government and non-profit organizations. This number is down from previous years due to the COVID pandemic.

In March, the ATI program was shut down by the state due to the COVID pandemic. During the few months that it was active they were able to:

- remove snow
- paint/strip and wax the Public Safety Building floors
- clean the County Highway and Building and Grounds offices
- wash and wax the Emergency Vehicles at the Waverly Fire Department
- wash trucks and clean floor drains at the Tioga County Highway barns

The amount of money saved by utilizing these work crews amount to approximately \$7,128 in labor costs, plus additional cost savings by providing an alternate sentencing option aside from a jail commitment.



The Tioga County Jail is currently accredited through the NYS Sheriffs' Association – Correctional Accreditation Program. The program is designed to establish and promote standards which are widely considered to be prudent and effective for operating a Correctional Facility. It provides formal recognition that the Jail meets or exceeds all 166 of these quality standards, which cover four major areas of the organization: Administration, Training, Technology and Operations.

### **Civil Office**

Under the NYS Constitution, each Sheriff's Office must operate a Civil Office. The Sheriff is a designated enforcement officer of the Supreme Court of New York and is responsible for enforcing lower court mandates.

The Civil Office is responsible for receiving, docketing, and serving civil processes issued by courts within and outside of New York and providing appropriate proofs of service. Their responsibility includes executing court orders, including warrants of eviction, writs of assistance, civil arrest warrants, orders of seizure, orders of attachment, and orders directing the conveyance of real property.

The Civil Office enforces judgments through enforcement of Income and Property Executions, directing the garnishment of wages, delivery of real property and the sale of real property at public Sheriff's sales. The proceeds of these enforcement procedures are collected and disbursed to the judgment creditors on a monthly basis. Sheriff's fees received for the service and enforcement of civil processes and mandates are collected pursuant to law and remitted to the County Treasurer.

The office is staffed by a Civil Manager and a Law Clerk and is in operation during business hours, Monday through Friday. Two part-time Deputy Sheriffs are assigned to provide personal service of processes.

The Sheriff's Civil Office was inspected and approved for Accreditation by the NYS Sheriffs' Association – Civil Office Accreditation Program. The program is designed to establish and promote standards which are widely considered to be prudent and effective for operating a Civil Office within New York State. It provides formal recognition that the Civil Office component meets or exceeds all 121 of the accreditation quality standards.

#### **Records Division and Pistol Permit Office**

The Records office is responsible for managing all legal documents generated by the Sheriff's Law Enforcement and Corrections operations. In addition to the traditional archival duties, this office interacts with the public and a variety of private and government organizations.


Dissemination of records and information are routinely performed for such agencies as: Insurance Companies; Dept. of Social Services; Dept. of Health; U.S. Military; Private Attorneys; local, state and federal courts.

The office is staffed by three civilian employees and operates during regular business hours.

#### **Pistol Permits**

The Sheriff's Office is responsible for processing and managing all Tioga County Pistol Permits, Gun Dealer, and Gun Smith Licenses. The issuing authority for all permits and gun licenses is Tioga County Judge Gerald Keene.

The Sheriff's Office supports Judge Keene by performing all administrative duties and background investigations. The Sheriff has authority to issue an official recommendation for granting or denying a license or a permit. To help defray some of the operating costs in performing these duties, the Sheriff's Office is permitted to charge a predetermined fee for each type of transaction.

## **Community Out-Reach**

#### **NYS Sheriff's Summer Camp Iroquois**

The Summer Camp Program, founded in 1977, was established by NYS Sheriffs to aid and enhance the development of the state's youth. In 2021, 6 children from Tioga County were selected to participate in the program, with all expenses being paid by the NYS Sheriff's Association. The camp also employed four counselors from Tioga County.

The children are selected with the help and input of area school officials and youth advocates who identify eligible children who they believe will benefit most from the experience.



The program is designed to foster a stronger relationship between the children and law enforcement and to give children a chance for a summer camp experience.





Located on the shores of Keuka Lake, outdoor learning activities, with professional instruction, are the cornerstone of the camp's recreational program. Team sports are also emphasized as a vehicle to reach comradeship and discipline.

Sheriffs' Offices from across the state volunteer Deputy Sheriffs to supplement the professional staff. The deputies spend a great deal of time with the kids, with many of them conducting demonstrations in the fields of archery, boating, water safety, and police dog exercise.

Corrections Officer Heather Krohmalney directed the program, and we thank her for volunteering to act as a mentor to the kids while at camp. Many volunteers from each school district are instrumental in helping to recruit eligible children and to complete a wide variety of prerequisite tasks in order that the children can attend the camp. These individuals have made our participation in the camp a success. We would also like to give a special thanks to Owego-Apalachin School District for the bus to get the children to and from camp, Rossi's Pizza for the food and numerous donations from the community to get each child a sleeping bag and sling bag.
